The eight hour **Resuscitation Officer Program** (with certificate) will prepare your hospital physicians, EMS leadership, nurses, respiratory therapists, and administrators to excel in resuscitation systems of care, including how to:

- Educate and prepare the community to deliver the most effective CPR
- Improve EMS response, EMS care and transition through hospital admission
- Organize Code Teams and Review Committees
- Coordinate evaluation, review, and debrief cardiac arrest events
- Deploy tools to improve quality of resuscitation (ETCO₂, Cerebral Oximetry, Ultrasound)
- Improve post-cardiac arrest care: Targeted Temperature Management, PCI, and ECMO
- Effectively train, conduct mock codes, and comprehensive CQI
